Successive Unbeaten Premierships for Tullibigeal in League's 90th Year

The Northern Riverina League celebrated ninety years since the competition began in 1924. In that time the League has seen many highs and lows but continued to produce a great avenue for our younger generation to advance their football skills.

The League's executive remained the same with all three continuing in their positions with Peter McFadyen as President, Ian Aubrey as Secretary and Keith Rees as Treasurer.

2014 recognized for the first time in League history the remarkable feat of a father and daughter elected as Presidents of the Northern Riverina Football League and Northern Riverina Netball League in Peter McFadyen and his daughter Fiona Bryant.

The competition consisted of the same seven teams - Tullibigeal, Barellan, Lake Cargelligo, West Wyalong Girral, Ungarie, Cobar and Hillston.

New leaders for the season included Simon Clarke at West Wyalong Girral, Shane Russell who moved from West Wyalong to take on the leadership at Lake Cargelligo, Jayden Boehm, who had previously played at Mildura in the Sunraysia League, took on the coaching role at Barellan as did Jono Williams at Cobar. Jack Bell was appointed Ungarie's new coach but unfortunately a broken leg had ruled him out for most of the season. James Nancarrow, who played in Hillston's 2007 premiership team, returned to Hillston after spending the last five seasons at Griffith, Queanbeyan and Surfers Paradise Football clubs with Nathan Sanson remaining at Tullibigeal for his second year.

Evans Memorial Trophy

The Evans Memorial Trophy for the best and fairest player voted by the umpires was won by Tullibigeal's Sonney Bartholomew for his outstanding season, polling twenty seven votes. Twenty one year old Bartholomew started his career at Lake Cargelligo, which included premiership victories as a young teenager in 2008 and 2010, before transferring to Tullibigeal in 2011. Lake Cargelligo's Aaron Hart was runner-up with twenty one votes with West Wyalong Girral coach Simon Clarke and Hillston's Josh Smith third with sixteen votes.

Sanson Trophy

With sixty seven goals in the home and away season, Tullibigeal's Brenton Browne won the League's leading goal kicker to claim the Sanson Trophy. Predominantly a backman throughout his career, Brenton led Tullibigeal's forward line from full-forward in his club's unbeaten season. On three occasions he booted ten or more goals in a game - Round 2 - thirteen goals against Barellan, Round 6 - ten goals against Ungarie and Round 12 - ten goals against West Wyalong Girral. Two five goal hauls in the second semi final and grand final respectively brought his season's tally to seventy seven goals. Lake Cargelligo's Rhys Ward was runner up with thirty six goals.

Presentation Night

The Presentation night was held at Ungarie with awards for football and netball competitions. Guest speaker at the presentation was ex Ungarie junior Anthony Daniher who played 233 VFL/ AFL games (115 with Sydney Swans and 118 with Essendon) and is one of the four Daniher brothers from Ungarie who all played VFL/AFL football at the highest level. Award winners for football included the League Best and Fairest won by Sonney Bartholomew, Coach of the Year went to James Nancarrow from Hillston, Goalkicker of the Year was Brenton Browne and Rising Star awarded to Mitchell Conlan from Barellan. The AFL NSW/ACT Volunteer of the year was awarded to Simon Irons from Barellan with an AFL Merit Award for his long involvement and services in the League. West Wyalong Girral's Keith and Paula Rees were both awarded life membership of the Northern Riverina Football League.

Season Summary

Tullibigeal won successive undefeated premierships with their victory over Lake Cargelligo in the 2014 grand final. It was only the fourth time a team had won successive undefeated premierships in the League's history after Tullibigeal (1946-47), Ungarie (1978-79) and Ungarie (1985-86) had accomplished the feat.

The Grasshoppers established themselves as flag favourites early in the season but only after just scrapping home by one point over Lake Cargelligo in Round 1.

The Lake Tigers, who had strengthened considerably with an aggressive recruitment drive, were considered Tullibigeal's main challengers and lost only two games for the season which were both to Tullibigeal. With the Tigers loss to Tullibigeal in Round 8 by sixty one points, it certainly appeared Tullibigeal were unbackable for the flag.

West Wyalong Girral started the season strongly and vied with Lake Cargelligo for second spot on the ladder but suffered four straight losses from Round 9 to Round 13. The Bulldogs' loss to Lake Cargelligo and Hillston's victory over Barellan in Round 13 saw the Swans jump into third spot and the Bulldogs drop back into fourth spot in the ladder;.

Hillston's appointment of a new coach renewed interest in the club and they improved considerably as the season progressed. Ungarie and Cobar battled out for fifth position all season and both finished equal on points from three wins each but Ungarie finished in fifth spot on percentages.

The previous season's grand finalists Barellan experienced a mass exodus of players and were severely weakened and with a young side could only manage a single victory for the season. The finals produced several close and exciting matches with the Hillston Swans pushing Lake Cargelligo in both their semifinal encounters and the 1st Semi final producing a cliff hanger with Hillston coming from behind to defeat West Wyalong Girral by a single point on the siren.

After a slow start in the grand final, Tullibigeal asserted their supremacy after quarter time to claim successive unbeaten premierships.

The Bulldogs lead was cut to eighteen points during the last quarter when Ungarie's Jarrod Brown booted two successive goals, however Bulldog coach Simon Clarke and James Turner, with late goals, sealed victory for West Wyalong Girral.

After trailing by twenty one points at half time, the Bulldogs with a six goal third term, set up a riveting last quarter when they reduced Hillston's lead to just five points at the last changeover. The Bulldogs looked to have the game in their keeping when they stretched their lead to eleven points with only five minutes

remaining, however Nancarrow stepped up with two goals for his club to pinch a spectacular victory.

Both have been integral stalwarts of the League.

Keith has been a player, coach, umpire, administrator, spectator and parent. He has been the League treasurer since 2006, a job he retains even in 2014 with the help of Paula. In fact Keith's involvement with the NRFNL started back in 1979 as a player and coach, having spent his earlier football career in the Barellan, South West, Riverina and Sydney Leagues. When he ditched the boots he took up the whistle in 1991 and prior to retiring from umpiring in 2004, Keith officiated at 250 senior games, including nine senior grand final plus numerous junior grand finals. And for some, like Keith, old habits are hard to give up so even now it is not unsual to see him take control of the centre bounce when needed, including during the 2014 final's series. Keith is also the NRFL judiciary officer and along with Paula are tireless workers for the League and AFL in general. Their interest in the code and bush football took on a new height in 2014 with the launch of the 90-year Northern Riverina Football League history book, researched over many years. Described by the League president Peter McFadyen as a 'terrific undertaking', the book had already generated much discussion around the League.

As for Paula, everyone knows there is usually a good woman behind a good man and while Keith's name may be attached to the title of treasurer, Paula herself is never far away assisting at every game. Paula was secretary of the West Wyalong Girral Bulldogs for five years and while no longer an 'official', continues to undertake their game day duties, helps organise presentation night, trophies, club membership and sponsorship, raffle selling evenings and the list goes on. It is this behind the scenes jobs Paula continues to assist the League with as the couple base their life throughout every winter around football. Accepting the honour of Life Membership Keith spoke about some of the early experiences in the NRFNL. He said both he and Paula were humbled by the honour with their long association due mainly to the immense enjoyment that get from being involved.
